

C.P.R. POLICE TEAM WIN IN CONTEST

Become First Aid All-Lines
Champions for 1931—
Notable Record

The Windsor Street station Canadian Pacific Police team are First Aid All Lines Champions for 1931 as a result of their victory by 13½ points over the Nelson, B.C., team, champions of western lines of the railway, in a contest staged at the Place Viger Hotel yesterday.

The Windsor station team who were the champions of eastern lines, was made up of the following constables: William H. Allison (captain), Owen Tomlinson, Andrew H. Stott, William W. Peterson, and Ernest G. Wykes. The Nelson team were Frederick Blakeman (captain), William W. Wood, Charles O. Anderson, John Sharlelow and John Fairbairn. The competition was directed by Colonel C. A. Hodgetts, director-general of the St. John Ambulance Association, Ottawa.

The All-Lines champions have a notable record this year. They have won every first aid competition in Canada possible for any police team to win. Beside defeating all Canadian Pacific teams they won the Quebec Provincial Championship; the Shaughnessy Shield representing the championship of Eastern Canada; and the Sherwood Shield, emblematic of the police championship of Canada. They were only five points behind the team of the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps which won the Montizambert Trophy, awarded to the team obtaining the highest number of marks in the several provincial championship competitions.

At the close of yesterday's competition, the two teams and a number of supporters assembled at the Place Viger Hotel, where the trophies won by the championship team were presented. Colonel Hodgetts gave those of the St. John Ambulance Association while General E. deB. Panet presented the trophies won in the competitions of the railway company. P. R. Haney was in the chair at the meeting.
